Assignment Overview

Online Component Summary and Expectations

Online discussions are designed to help you apply the concepts of psychology to your daily life. There are 6 online discussions that cover two different topics. For each topic there are two to three TEDtalk videos featuring experts in the field describing their work. You must select at least one video based on your interests to watch and discuss for each topic. Each individual video will take about 10-22 minutes to watch.

For each discussion you must make one initial post and at least one response post. In your initial post, for each topic you must describe key points that you learned from the video you selected. In addition, you should discuss how you can apply what you learned. Your response posts to your classmates should be add more to the conversation, give or add to examples discussed in class, that relates to the topic, or maybe information learned in other classes that might correlate. There is a grading rubric attached to the discussion with a breakdown of the points.

Assignments

In Class Activities - During class time you will participate in lecture activities, discussions, and learning checks. You must be **present** and **actively engaged** in class to earn these points. If you arrive late or leave early, you will only earn activity points for the activities you have completed while present.

Class Presentation - You will present a brief (10 minute) presentation about a topic in psychology that you would like to learn more about. This can cover any psychology related topic, such as research, career opportunities, psychopharmacology, ethics, therapies, etc.

Online Discussions - Online discussions are designed to help you apply the concepts of psychology to your daily life. There are 6 online discussions that cover two different topics. For each topic there are two to three TEDtalk videos featuring experts in the field describing their work. You must select at least one video based on your interests to watch and discuss for each topic. Each individual video will take about 10-22 minutes to watch. You will also need to read and reply to another student's post.

Examinations

Weekly Quizzes- The student is expected to complete all readings before class. To encourage learning, students will complete brief quizzes covering the readings for that week.

Midterm Exam - During Week 4, there is a mid-term exam given in D2L covering the material for weeks 1-4.

Final Exam - During Week 8, there is a final exam given in D2L covering the material for weeks 5-8.


