## Assignment Overview

### Assignments

#### **CURRENT EVENT:**

#### Description:

Students will submit Current Event assignments most weeks. Current Event Assignments will be due during weeks 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7. Your review of the Current Event should be submitted as a Word document. Your total write-up and explanation should be approximately 150 words. Each Current Event posting should include the following:

1. Give the complete reference where you found the article should be listed.
2. Give a brief review of the article as it is written by the author.
3. Give your creative ideas on how this current event ties into the material we are covering in class this week.

You should submit this document during the designated class and on time.

Method of Evaluation:

Each of these Current Events will have a value of 20 points. To achieve the maximum number of points for your submission be sure to follow the points outlined above. Point 3 is especially important as this area gives you the opportunity to be creative and include the material we are covering in class.

**Class Participation and Attendance**

Description:

Being an active participant in class discussions is important. Also, each student should contribute in a very positive way with group members to assist the group in developing and presenting their group and course project.

Method of Evaluation:

Attendance is worth 100 points to the final grade . Points will be subtracted for each day of absence.

**Country Inventory:**

Description - Students will submit a country inventory for a country they have selected. This country inventory will be made up of four parts. These four parts are cultural geography, physical geography, political geography and what the future holds for this country.

Method of Evaluation: The paper should be approximately 4 pages in length. The country inventory has a value of a total of 200 points.
