# Assignment Overview

## Online Component Expectations

In Weeks 2-7, you are required to actively participate in an online discussion. The initial post must be at least 100 words and any references should be cited using APA formatting. You must also respond to at least 2 other students. Responses must be substantive and initiate further discussion on the topic. A response post of "good post" or "I agree with you" will not receive credit. Response postings do not require supporting references. Each discussion will be worth 25 points (20 points for initial post, 5 points for responses).

# Assignments

Paper: Each student is required to write an APA term paper of 10-15 pages. It should relate to the history and systems of psychology. You may, for example, survey an important idea in the history of psychology or review the work of a key figure. You must include at least ten references. A half page abstract(description of your paper) is due at the end of Week 2.

The paper will consist of a cover page, an abstract, an introduction, the main body of the paper discussing your topic, a summary and a reference section. All components are to be written in APA format. I have provided a ppt in D2L that outlines the basics of APA formatting and we will discuss them more in class.

A grading rubric will be provided in class.

You will take a total of four exams, that include the midterm and the final. The exams will consist of multiple choice questions. These exams will be as per the schedule in order to keep students current on the readings. Students with an approved absence can take the make-up exam as per below.
